Action DD is Now a Tax Exempt 501(c)(4) Non-profit Corporation

Action DD can now receive donations from corporations and benevolent organizations that have not previously donated. This is a big step forward in Action's ability to represent a full continuum of care for people with developmental disabilities such as our loved ones at Fircrest School.

Action DD's Summer meeting saw decisions to have just one general membership meeting a year and one legislative reception in Olympia. The reception will be February 2nd at 10 a.m. in room 221 of the Cherburg building.

With the increased use of email, Facebook and other social media, more can be done with fewer meetings and the day-long drives that go with them., but expect more board meetings as Action prepares for the coming legislative session.

To build community across Shoreline neighborhoods the Council of Neighborhoods representatives, neighborhood association board members and key neighborhood leaders visited Fircrest in July. The social gathering included a a picnic, and introduction to Fircrest. Jeff Flesner, Acting Superintendent, explained Fircrest programs and the campus with a short tour.

This two-way communication allows neighborhood associations to provide community input and the City to present information on programs and projects.

Launi Whedon, Friends of Fircrest board member attended and shares her impressions. "As far as I can tell

three factors have come together recently creating the response that is WINGS."

- An aging population of unprecedented size
- A substantial increase in the number of aging individuals facing impairment issues, from mild cognitive decline, to dementia, and beyond
- A court system overwhelmed by applications for guardianship or other legal means of controlling the health and financial choices (and resources) of those aging individuals.

Animal Assisted Activities and Animal Assisted Therapy

Many of you may have seen big, loveable Obi, Shan Wilson's labradoodle, on campus, visiting residents. If you have been around a while, you may also remember our Portuguese Water Dogs; Kitty (who has crossed the Rainbow Bridge), her daughter Pickles, and granddaughter Billie who visited when ever their busy therapy schedules allowed. Kitty's great-great-grandson, "Fido", aka "Maratime Do Gato's Fidus Aquaticus". Jim has been saving that name for a boy dog for probably about 15 years.

What are Animal Assisted Activities and Animal Assisted Therapy, or now referred to as Animal Assisted Interventions?

Animal Assisted Activities (AAA) are usually considered as being beneficial visits that do not necessarily have a specific goal/outcome in mind, and do not necessarily work with or under the direct supervision of professional staff.

Animal Assisted Therapy/Animal Assisted Interventions (AAT/AAI) are visits that are conducted with professional staff, such as physical or occupational therapists, etc. There is a specific goal in mind, and outcomes are documented.

Immediately when Fido came home, at 8 weeks, he began doing



therapy visits. His visits include North-West Hospital Gero-Psych; Shorewood HS 2 visits a week, and 2-3 visits per week with College Dogs, the program I created on college and university cam-

puses.

Many of the dogs I work with (teaching, testing, and visiting with) start as older dogs. With the right dog, you can start at any age.

For some terminology and definitions, the dogs that make these visits are *Therapy Dogs* as opposed to *Service Dogs* (i.e. Guide Dogs, Seizure Alert). Technically speaking, Therapy Dogs have no legal access (i.e. riding in the cabin of airplanes; going into restaurants, etc.). There are sometimes "mixed messages" e.g. restaurants that offer outdoor dining, and allow pets to accompany their owners.

Therapy Dogs often go through training in order to pass a specific organization's test, enabling them to be covered by that organization's insurance. A couple of the larger organizations are, Alliance of Therapy Dogs (formerly Therapy Dogs Inc. of which I am a Tester/Observer for ATD.) Others include Pet Partners (their team are considered 'registered' as opposed to certified') and Therapy Dogs International. For my own Sirius Healing, I am able to certify puppies (other organizations require 1 year of age minimum).

What kind of dog does it take to be a good therapy dog? A friendly, relatively calm dog. Dogs that are sociable and love people are the foundations of great therapy dogs. Having Obedience skills, such as sit, down, and stay are minimally required parts of each organization's test.

With ATD, each team is also required to do three shadow visits with their canine partner. For teams I test, I utilize the Skilled Nursing units at Fircrest. The shadow visits are an excellent way to see how a team works together when encountering individuals with different health and other problems. I have found the population at Fircrest to be extremely rewarding to visit, and an excellent place to both test and do the shadow visits — I am always recruiting for teams to

visit at Fircrest. More teams are needed.

My dogs visit 2-3 days per week. People may think that being "petted all day long" isn't hard on a dog. It is. It's a constant stimulation that actually does tire them out. One of the most important things I teach people is how to understand their dogs' signs of stress, and how to deal with it in order to ensure their canine teammate will want to continue to do therapy visits. Pickles, our 12 year old, has been doing visits since she was 8 weeks old; Billie has done the same since age 8.

Many years ago, a 3 1/2 year old



Portuguese Water Dog came to us when his owner was dying. "Rio" became an outstanding therapy dog for virtually the next 10+ years. Another factor we always have to consider is heat: with the heat wave in Seattle I had to cancel visits for 2 weeks. 90 degree weather is too hot for the dogs to visit.

The dogs and I are hoping to work both the Skilled Nursing Units and Senior Day program back into our rounds. Summer might be easier since colleges and universities are on break, but we are recruiting.

iPads as Art Therapy

A group of developmentally disabled adults in Hamilton Ontario is the first to prove that a new form of art therapy works.

The group from a Salvation Army Ministry has been painting, drawing and making puzzles with laptops and tablets.

Their artwork is being published in the Journal on Developmental Disabilities as part of a study led by Waterloo Lutheran Seminary of Wilfrid Laurier University, suggesting digital technology should be incorporated into adult art therapy programs.



"The key overall is providing a variety of mediums," said lead researcher and art therapist Olena Darewych. "Let them explore as many as you can. This is a new medium so let's integrate it."

The study came about by accident. At the Salvation
Army's Paparella Innovative Community Art Program, Darewych watched a speech language therapist take a photo of an autistic artist's painting and turn it into a puzzle on an iPad.

"We started to explore digital applications and the possibility of digital art. I knew they existed but digital art is not my specialty, " said Darewych.

She soon discovered no research has been done on digital technology for adults with developmental disabilities. The only published studies so far have involved children.

FROM OUR TREASURER

Dear Friends of Fircrest,

Your response to our late spring newsletter has been gratifying. Thank you for your membership renewals as well as your donations. Funds you provide support public awareness and client programs.

Our coffers this year will not be any where near what we had in 2014 when we were blessed with a generous Grant from the Gertrude and Eldon Sallee Foundation. The \$42,500 went to recreational, therapeutic/communication programs and equipment for Fircrest residents and respite clients. It also supported a scholarship fund for Friendship Adventures, a non profit private organization providing activities and socialization programs for DD citizens

in King County, including Fircrest residents. The Grant Committee is working on a application for further Grant funds.

We work from our operational budget for the day to day cost of mailings, outreach and to support music entertainment art/garden and recreation programs for residents. We will be able to continue doing so on a limited basis thru the end of the year.

Our money market account is ear marked for care and maintenance of the Therapy Garden, as stipulated by the Grantor of that fund. Our business savings account is held as a contingency for operating and client support costs if our operating account falls short. Our investment account is our safety net if, God forbid, we need

to hire legal and PR pros in the event Fircrest is threatened...and the amount in that account becomes but a retainer.

So Friends, there you have it. Our small organization has a lot at stake and thrives through your continued support. By the way, of the approximately 340 members on our mailing list, fewer than 10% pay dues. Those who *re-up* annually and send additional funds are indeed our *angels!* Even if one is unable to support with dues or donations, we are thankful for your interest and your *voices* which speak up on behalf of our loved ones at RHCs-you are our troopers!
