Sanctions may see Rainier lose 60 residents 24 of them to Fircrest

or more than a year, Fircrest has been under sanction from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. During a routine inspection, CMS found that Fircrest was failing to provide aggressive active treatment of ICF residents in PAT A. DSHS is working to regain certification. Until Fircrest is in compliance no federal money can be used for new residents. According to Superintendent, Megan DeSmet, Sanctions against Fircrest School are expected to be lifted this Fall.

Rainier School is in worse trouble. After a series of investigations CMS found violations including failure to keep clients safe and failure to report allegations of abuse and more.

Federal money has been withheld for new admissions until the facility comes into compliance. For the first time Medicaid officials are planning to withhold funding for new admissions as well as current residents.

The affected portion of Rainier is PAT C an ICF residential care unit with about 100 of Rainier's 350 residents. Because Rainier has no Nursing facility, 60 of them would transfer out of Rainier to community placements. 24 of them are scheduled to be send to Fircrest.

DSHS Deputy Assistant Secretary, Don Clintsman says they will appeal. But he said, "Our current thinking is to pursue the approach that will increase community residential options that allow residents to transition out.

To minimize harm to vulnerable residents Rainier requested the construction of an SNF facility on Their campus as an alternative to leaving. Even if this request is granted much time would elapse before it would be opened.

Aggressive Active Treatment Can Deny ICF/IID Care

ast year, Fircrest School and Rainier School were decertified by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) for failure to meet CMS care standards. This was due in part by insufficient staffing at the RHCs and by a fundamental method of treatment change made by CMS. That method, now in use affects how RHCs accept new residents and treats existing ones. It is called, "Continuous and Aggressive Active Treatment." Clients for whom this new method is deemed inappropriate are scheduled to move from Rainier School. As many as sixty residents are affected. Fircrest School and Lakeland village residents can expect the same. This new method is about to become law in our state.

What is "Continuous and Aggressive Active Treatment?" In its simplest definition it means that clients must be trained to acquire life skills that would make them more independent.

Here is how the new law reads: "NEW SECTION WAC 388-837-9010 Must a client in an ICF/IID be able to benefit from active treatment? An individual admitted to a residential habilitation center's intermediate care facility for individuals with intellectual disabilities must be in need of and able to benefit from continuous and aggressive active treatment."

What has DSHS said about this? In a 2017 document they said, "CMS has emphasized the 'intermediate' aspect of institutional care. That is, it is the responsibility of the RHC not to house and protect people, but rather to be actively preparing them for leaving the RHC and integrating into

the community."

The document went on to say, "Several stakeholders will welcome the additional emphasis on compliance with continuous and aggressive active treatment in accordance with federal regulations, including CMS and Disability Rights Washington (DRW). There may also be some resistance from RHC resident stakeholder groups such as Friends of Fircrest, Friends of Rainier, and Friends of Lakeland Village. Many family members and guardians have viewed the RHCs as a place where people are healthy and safe, not where they are pushed every day to achieve more functional abilities in order to transition out of the RHC."

This addition to the RHC treatment paradigm furthers the Inclusionist ideology that all "institutions" should close. This flies in face of the Supreme Court's Olmstead decision which states in part: "This Court emphasizes that nothing in the ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) or its implementing regulations condones termination of institutional settings for persons unable to handle or benefit from community settings. Nor is there any federal requirement that community-based treatment be imposed on patients who do not desire it."

We as family, friends and guardians know that the continual drive toward, "deinstitutionalization" is not best for those in need of close care. But, how can any one of us change any of this? Ultimately, our law makers make the changes. You have legislators and congressmen who will listen to your concerns. As for me, I have three legislators and my son at Fircrest School has three more. All of them will hear from me.

Study Finds No Link Between Prenatal Tdap Vaccine, Autism

vaccine that's strongly recommended for pregnant women does not influence the odds that their children will develop autism, according to a large new study.

Researchers looked at data on more than 81,000 children born between 2011 and 2014 to assess the impact of the Tdap vaccination — which protects against tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis, also known as whooping cough — given during pregnancy. They found no association between women who received the shot and the likelihood of autism in their children.

"Pregnant women can be reassured by this study that there is no indication of an increased risk of autism spectrum disorder in children after being exposed prenatally to the Tdap vaccine," said Tracy Becerra-Culqui of Kaiser Permanente Southern California's Department of Research & Evaluation who led the study which was published this week in the journal Pediatrics

For the study, researchers reviewed medical records of children born at Kaiser Permanente hospitals in Southern California. Of mothers who received the Tdap vaccine during pregnancy, 1.5 percent of their kids were later diagnosed with autism.

Meanwhile, 1.8 percent of children whose moms were not immunized prenatally were ultimately diagnosed with the developmental disorder, the study found.

"The link between vaccination and development of autism has been refuted by many rigorous scientific investigations. Unfortunately, the misconceptions still generate concerns," said Hung Fu Tseng of Kaiser Permanente who worked on the study.

Federal Disability Policy Office Proposed

ederal policy is often implemented with little consideration for how it will impact people with disabilities, but that could change under a new proposal.

A bill introduced this month in



the U.S. Senate calls for the creation of an Office of Disability Policy.

Housed within the nonpartisan Government Accountability Office, the proposed

entity would be specifically tasked with reviewing legislative and regulatory plans to assess how they would affect Americans with disabilities.

If established, members of Congress would be able to request reviews looking at how legislation, guidance and regulations might impact those with disabilities and the individuals who support them, much like lawmakers can already seek input from GAO on matters generally.

Additionally, the legislation calls for the office to produce an annual report evaluating the impact of enacted bills and regulations on the disability community.

"The Office of Disability Policy Act would provide people with disabilities and the general public with unbiased information about how proposed bills could affect them," said Sen. Bob Casey, D-Pa., chief sponsor of the proposal.

Aside from Casey, the bill is co-

sponsored by Sen. Maggie Hassan, D-N.H., and Sen. Tammy Duckworth, D-III.

Microsoft CEO says son's developmental disability impacted his leadership

SEATTLE -- It's not every day somebody will admit the birth of their first child left them devastated. But that's the very honest confession from the CEO of Microsoft, Satya Nadella.

"I was 29 when Zain was born," Nadella said about the birth of his son in 1996. He and his wife, had been anxiously awaiting their first born.

"The night he was born, everything changed," Nadella said.

"In utero asphyxiation caused a severe case of brain damage, which led to cerebral palsy. To be honest, for a few years after, I was thrown a real curve ball because all my plans were out. I said, 'why did this happen to me? What happened to us?'"

Nadella said watching his wife put together a team of doctors and therapists, all dedicated to helping Zain, changed his perspective.

"That's what I think ultimately woke me up, to recognize that nothing happened to me," he said.
"Something happened to Zain,"

"Nadella says, he's always trying to find "harmony." Adding, "Some days I get. Some days I regress, but each day I try to get better."
